Welcome to the CEPA Fair 2014

The Fair on Experiences and Best Practices in Communication, Education and Public Awareness (CEPA) provides an opportunity for Parties and Organizations to highlight their work and contribution to the implementation of the https://doi.org/10.108/journal.org/ of the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD).

The CEPA Fair has two parts: one is on issues related to the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety (29 Sep - 3 Oct, during COP-MOP 7), and one is on issues related to the CBD and the Nagoya Protocol on Access and Benefit-sharing (6-16 Oct, during COP 12).

During COP-MOP 7, participants will highlight national experiences, good practices and lessons learned on various themes, in particular in the design and implementation of biosafety capacity-building activities as well as outreach materials and activities for raising public awareness, education and participation concerning the safe transfer, handling and use of living modified organisms.

During COP 12, activities will measure the progress of implementation of the <u>Strategic Plan for Biodiversity 2011-2020</u> and the celebration of the <u>United Nations Decade on Biodiversity</u>. The focus will be on <u>Aichi Biodiversity Target 1</u>: By 2020, at the latest, people are aware of the values of biodiversity and the steps they can take to conserve and use it sustainably.

The CEPA Fair includes two components: 1) an **exhibition** of outreach materials (kiosks) showcasing outreach materials such as posters, brochures, audiovisual, etc., and 2) thematic **side events** (presentation and/or performance), where Parties and Organizations demonstrate their activities related to the relevant themes.



Solid ABS mechanisms on a national level can only be obtained through effective communication to and between actors that are providing, using, or regulating genetic resources. Key players concerned are local communities, research institutions, academia, traders, corporate business and government and administration. Representatives from the research and business associations, as well as from SCBD and the ABS Initiative, will share their experiences in addressing ABS key players. A focus will be put on communication strategies and formats, best practices in that regard – and remaining challenges.
