Ex 3: Mainstreaming at national level – entry points and windows







FOR YOUR CHOSEN SECTOR:

- What are the main activities in this sector that have negative impacts on biodiversity;
- 2. What are the main policies, legislation, strategies and programmes in the sector/ issue (include those that are planned or in development);
- 3. At what stage of policy development/ implementation is each policy, legislation, strategy or programme? e.g. Strategy Development, Implementation, Monitoring, Evaluation, Revision/Review;
- 4. What priority is this sector/issue for mainstreaming biodiversity on a scale of 1 to 10 (1 = low priority; 10 = top priority)?
- 5. What financial resources do you think would be required to successfully mainstream biodiversity, given the findings above?
- 6. What stakeholders, rights-holders and interest groups need to be involved in the sector/issue?
- 7. What key messages should be communicated to the sector, including the stakeholders, rights-holders and interest groups (see Exercise 4)?

Ex 3: Mainstreaming at national level – entry points and windows







- Present a brief overview of your findings to the plenary;
- Place your issue/ sector on the "mainstreaming priority continuum" **in relation to other sectors** where biodiversity mainstreaming needs to take place;
- What will need to be done to move the issue higher in priority?
- In which sector/ issue will we find the most biodiversity benefit (return on investment) in terms of finance, time, effort)?









Ex. 4: Mainstreaming at national level – stakeholder and rights-holder participation








In the same groups, and addressing the same sector/ issue and using the stakeholders, rights-holders and interested parties identified in Ex. 3, carry out a stakeholder analysis:

- 1) Determine the interests of the different stakeholders, rights-holders and interested parties;
- 2) Identify the convergence and divergence of their interests with the biodiversity agenda;
- 3) Determine what their level of influence/ power in the sector is;
- 4) Identify the links/ alliances between different groups.













Ex 5: Mainstreaming at national level – communication







In the same groups, and addressing the same sector/ issue:

- Determine the communications, education and public awareness needs of the revised NBSAP particularly for influencing mainstreaming:
 - Who should be targeted? (possible to have more than 1 target group)
 - What are the key messages to be communicated?
 - When should they be targeted?
 - How should they be targeted? What methods will be used?
 - What information is needed?
 - What partners share the same goals?







Ex. 5: Mainstreaming at national level – action plan development







In the same groups, and addressing the same sector/ issue:

- 1. Assess the actions, the timelines, actors and budget required to successfully implement each target.
- 2. Assess how we will measure success. What needs to happen/change to achieve the target? [Indicators]
- 3. Assess what the NFP/MoE/ biodiversity unit will have to do to make the change happen?









Ex. 7: NBSAPs as Policy Instruments







- 1. Undertake a SWOT analysis of your existing NBSAP (bearing in mind also your plans for your revised/ updated NBSAP)
 - a) Analyse the internal factors that have led to successes (strengths) and failures (weaknesses)
 - b) Analyse the external factors that will and do support the NBSAP (opportunities) and those that will pose challenges (threats)
- 2. Undertake a PESTEL analysis
 - a) Analyse the political, economic, sociocultural, technological, legal and environmental factors that the NBSAP will operate in.
- 3. Given the analyses above, discuss the best policy form for the NBSAP
