A number of ministries and government agencies have responsibility for conservation and management of natural resources in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, while the National Commission for Wildlife Conservation and Development (NCWCD) serves as the focal national agency for the purpose. NCWCD is governed by a cross-sectoral Board of Directors headed by the Second Deputy Prime Minister. The Ministry of Agriculture, Presidency of Meteorology and Environment (PME) and the Ministry of Water are the other key agencies involved in issues related to biodiversity management. The National Biodiversity Committee provides a forum for inter-agency linkages on biodiversity issues. Q83and 84

Though not a developed country Saudi Arabia has contributed about US\$ 76 billion over the past three decades as development aid to over 73 needy countries. The Kingdom's bilateral aid is as high as 4% of the GNP, besides no extraneous conditions attached to the granting of aid. The aid provided through the Islamic Development Bank, Arab League forums, the OPEC Fund for International Development and other multilateral institutions are in addition to this. Natural resources conservation and sustainable utilisation is a key area of support.

A dedicated training centre, The Training Centre for Conservation of Natural Resources was established in 1998 to fill the need for capacity building and formal training of staff in the diverse fields of protected area management. It is located in Riyadh at the headquarters of the National Commission for Wildlife Conservation and Development (NCWCD). The interest and positive response from the Arab region to this facility has encouraged NCWCD to transform it into a regional Training Centre. A large number of programmes are offered each year as well as programs based on special needs.

The Centre's activities are concentrated into four main subject areas:

- 1- Conservation of natural resources including planning and management of protected areas, training of rangers, captive breeding and release, etc.
- 2- Special environmental public awareness training for staff of government agencies and the media.
- 3- Environmental education for educators of both sexes for all stages of schooling, vocational training, and extra curricular activities.
- 4- Public environmental education / awareness through panel discussions, seminars and workshops to discuss pressing environmental issues.

Further comments on implementation of this Article

Saudi Arabia has been providing open access to genetic resources in the form of samples for research organisations and botanic gardens from other Parties. In particular instances (for example, collaboration with the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, in the development of an international seedbank), the formal understandings reached with the recipient organisations specifically cover elements of use of the material. However, in other instances less formal agreements are in place. In addition, the Kingdom has no mechanism to monitor if and how these genetic resources have been used for commercial purposes by the recipient entities. We also need to improve the system to check the unauthorised export of genetic resources. It may be also noted that Saudi Arabia is more of a provider of genetic resources.

An international mechanism, within the framework of CBD or outside, needs to be created to monitor the scientific and commercial use of genetic resources obtained, either through the due process or otherwise, in order to report on the violations of the relevant provisions of CBD.

The Kingdom's conservation doctrine with the triple objective of conservation, sustainable use and equitable benefit sharing predates the Convention. The shortage of trained manpower poses difficulties in fully undertaking all the programs that we are set to undertake. Therefore our strategy is to take a gradual but progressive course. The primary areas of the Kingdom's focus have been the restoration of critical species and in-situ conservation through protected areas, and solid achievements have been made in both these endeavours. As the objectives of biodiversity management is increasingly permeating into sectoral agencies it is gaining a prominent position on the national agenda. The following are the laws that provide the basis for biodiversity management in the Kingdom:
